

President's Annual Report

June 1, 2020 – May 31, 2021

When our fiscal year began June 1, 2020, the Bethlehem Historical Association had been shut down in accordance with pandemic restrictions since the middle of March. The museum was closed and all events, including our annual meeting, had to be cancelled.

On September 1, in response to a significant decrease in local COVID cases, the Trustees unanimously voted to open the museum on Sunday afternoons starting September 13, pending all pertinent COVID restrictions be in place. It was arranged. We were open just three Sunday afternoons when, on October 7, a strong storm hit the area. Its damaging winds ripped the power and phone lines from the building. Ten days later, the repairs were completed, but then an alarming spike in COVID cases caused us to remain closed. A total of fifty-five visitors had come to the museum in just the three two – hour sessions we were able to be open and receive them.

Finally, on the first Sunday in May, conditions allowed us to again open the museum to the public. With restrictions now lifted, we are optimistically planning to resume our speaker series and public events in the upcoming season.

Building and Grounds Improvements

Volunteers continued to work throughout the long shutdown. This was accomplished either by working at home or in the museum, masked and socially distanced. The buildings and grounds greatly benefited from the time and opportunity afforded by the otherwise difficult situation.

- Both museum rooms were thoroughly cleaned and freshly painted.
- The windows were washed, inside and outside.
- The front gardens were planted and tended.
- The Carriage House was thoroughly cleaned, reorganized and new shelving was added.
- Throughout the summer, various volunteers researched, designed, and constructed all new exhibits.
- Exhibit space was improved by the remodeling of the "big wall", the replacement of heavy glass with lightweight plexiglass on three cases, the addition of a new, triangular exhibit unit and installation of new corkboards.

Building and Grounds Issues

The Highway Department was regularly advised of needed repairs. In April a new bilco door was

installed.

On May 8, a meeting, organized by Supervisor VanLuven, was held for the purpose of getting a general assessment of the building's physical condition. Town officials and BHA representatives met with Beth Mosall, an architect trained in historic restoration. There are significant issues in need of attention. The Town will prioritize those needs and apply for grant assistance to address them.

The person who has cleaned the museum bathroom for many years is no longer able to continue on any dependable schedule. As of this date, there is no solution..

Shortage of parking space during events continues to be a serious issue.

A lack of appropriate storage space and an adequate work area are ongoing challenges.

Communication

Our newsletters and yearbook were produced and distributed on schedule including an extra newsletter issue.

To communicate with our members in a more efficient, professional manner, we began to use the e-mail platform, *Mail Chimp*.

Our website was significantly reorganized, updated, and enhanced.

Community Engagement

Several members participated in *Bethlehem Forward* meetings. Two BHA members serve on the Comprehensive Plan Update Committee, advocating for formation of a town historic preservation commission.

A local girl scout, with some BHA support, created a new walking tour of the Four Corners/ Elsmere area. It was introduced to the community on May 22. Isabella Richards earned a Gold Badge, the highest achievement in girl scouting, for her outstanding efforts.

The teachers who run our successful in-person fourth grade program have developed a kit of materials, including artifacts, to supplement the second-grade curriculum. This kit is available for loan by second grade teachers in the district.

In May, we presented a virtual tour of the museum via Zoom to the *Women Who Care* group at the Presbyterian Church.

This spring a new program for children was created to give parents an opportunity to provide their children some cultural enrichment in a safe environment during the pandemic. We developed several play-based learning activities and offered ninety- minute sessions that could be reserved at the museum for a family's exclusive use. We are

Historic Research, Documentation & Preservation

Collection committee members are in the process of reviewing and updating records as well as systematically photographing each object in the collections.

All ephemera is now organized into archival envelopes, file folders, and boxes. The long process of analyzing and coordinating that information as well as the transcribing and digitizing of correspondence and diaries continues.

The historic markers in town have been inventoried. A map indicating their locations has been created and restoration of markers that need repair or painting is in the works. An application for an additional marker noting Elisha Hurlbut's influential support for women's suffrage was submitted. The town has potential for additional markers.

Membership and Administrative Matters.

The current membership renewal effort is underway and to date indicates again that our loyal members have stuck with us despite the lengthy unfortunate circumstances.

Members approved the recommendations of the nomination committee. They re-elected Karen Beck to her fourth term as president. We are pleased to welcome two new trustees to our board, Andrew Reilly and John Smolinsky.

BHA is financially dependent on membership dues and donations. The fundraising committee held a successful virtual bake sale in lieu of their traditional Election Day sale at the Schoolhouse.

The association continues to be an all-volunteer organization. The town is fortunate to have such a hard-working group of people dedicated to maintaining this wonderful community asset.

We believe having a well-defined, congenial relationship with the Town is critical


